Greetings to all, as we commence our tenth year as an IRS 501 (C) (3) non-profit charitable corporation. In spite of the challenges presented by the current pandemic, we continue to pursue our core mission of promoting alumni connectivity, giving back to THS, and having fun. We were saddened to defer our planned "all-class" reunion another year due to the challenges imposed by public health conditions in August 2021. We are planning our next "all-class" reunion for August 22, 2022 at Sherman Valley Ranch, provided the public health status will permit. We are hoping we can get back to the atmosphere created during the "all class" reunion of September 2019. Our large gathering of 300++alumni were able to have unencumbered camaraderie and fun without having to worry about masks and vaccines. On the bright side the 2021 THSAA Artesian Classic Golf Tournament was a huge success with sixteen teams (64 players) signed up on a cool windy June 5th afternoon. The tournament featured several past and present THS football coaches; Sid Otton, Bill Beattie, Pat Alexander, and Rick McGrath (this created a mini-reunion of sorts as several golf participants were former THS football players and wrestlers). Also featured were Tumwater School District administrators; Brian Hardcastle, Jim Brittain and Dana Fraser. THSAA Artesian Classic is our primary fund-raising activity in support of our scholarship program and we'll continue to "lean" on the goal of having a full 36 team tournament. Special thanks go to all participants, sponsors, volunteers, and board members for this successful event. Scholarship awards to deserving graduating seniors has been our main focus of "giving back" to THS. This year we were able to again award a total of \$9,000 to six 2021 graduating seniors. In today's cost of higher education \$1,500 might fund a quarter at a local community college; we would love to be able to greatly increase the amount in the coming years. The Artesian Golf Classic has funded a few scholarships each year in the past; however, in recent years the majority of funding has come from several donations from alumni in varying amounts and we are grateful for their support. Of special note are a couple of alumni who have donated significant amounts over the past several years which has allowed us to triple the amount of scholarship awards recently. Greetings Alumni Association! Thank you for your continued support and I am excited to share some important updates with you all. Here are some things we are continuing

to work on as we strive to uphold our values of pride, tradition, and courage. This year has been very unique as we have moved back to a full day schedule while continuing to enforce our safety guidelines, social distancing, and testing. Our **Athletic Director, Tim Graham,** has done incredible work to make sure that we can continue to compete and perform. This fall our Football program played in the state championship, placing 2nd in state! It was the

end of an incredible year and we are so proud of their accomplishments.

MASCOT

Last year, the State Legislature passed HB 1356, which banned the inappropriate use of Native American names or symbols as a mascot, logo, or team name. To honor the sovereignty of the Nisqually and Squaxin Island tribes, it was Board President Melissa Beard and not district staff who approached the tribes to ask permission to continue the use of the Thunderbird as the THS mascot. Melissa's conversation with each tribe focused on how the district could work with the tribe to educate students about the history of the land on which the school district sits. The Nisqually tribe passed a resolution in December allowing the continued use of the Thunderbird and credited the school with being respectful in how they used the Thunderbird. Both tribes are excited to work with THS students to teach the history of the Thunderbird, what it means to the tribes, and create Thunderbird art that honors the traditions of both THS and each of the tribes. We are proud that this requirement will lead to partnerships that benefit all involved.

Thank you THS Alumni Association for your continued support. We are excited to continue the legacy of excellence that you started.


Another outstanding THS Graduate, Bob Iyall
