Days and the Homecoming dance was attended by about 800 students! We also held the first ever THS class competitions that included tug-o-war, plank walk races, pie eating contests, and several other events – approximately 150 students showed up to this event and we're already looking forward to doing this during our Spring Spirit Week.

There are so many ways that people associated with Tumwater High School do things that continue to make this place special and it doesn't take long to see and feel the results. The vibe at THS is good!

In my first year as Principal of THS, I couldn't have hoped for a better start with a better staff. We have an incredible team of people that are finding ways to create great high school memories for our students as well as setting them up for success in their post-high school endeavors. # 2023 Scholarship Winners

THSAA awarded five \$1,500 and one \$1,750 secondary education scholarships to graduating THS seniors. The scholarship selection is made based upon leadership, scholarship and community service. 





#### **BIO OF FRANCIS Q. HOANG**

Francis Q. Hoang is an entrepreneur who has been on the founding teams of companies that have generated over \$600 million of combined sales and employed over 1,200 professionals across the fields of law, aerospace, defense, government services, and technology. He currently serves as Co-Founder and Co-CEO of **boodleAI**, a technology company building BoodleBox, an all-in-one platform for streamlining Generative AI tasks.

France also serves as the Executive Chairman for **Allied Airlift 21 (AA21)**, which has enabled the evacuation of over 2,000 Afghan Allies from Afghanistan through Kabul Airport, a private charter flight, and State Department coordinated flights.



France was recently invited by the Chairman of the Board of the West Point Association of Graduates to join a select group of 30 alumni and friends of the Academy to serve on the **Campaign Cabinet for West Point Ready**, a \$600.5 million campaign to benefit USMA and WPAOG.

France has over 25 years of national security experience, with service in every branch of the U.S. Government. He clerked for Judge Thomas Griffith on the U.S. Court of Appeals for the D.C. Circuit, was a summer law clerk to Judge Jamie Baker on U.S. Court of Appeals for the Armed Forces, served as a law clerk to the Senate Judiciary Committee, and was appointed by President George W. Bush as an Associate White House Counsel and Special Assistant to the President. Shortly after leaving the White House, France mobilized in support of Operation ENDURING FREEDOM where he served as the Executive Officer of a U.S. Army Special Forces Company on a combat deployment in Southeast Afghanistan.

France previously deployed to the Former Yugoslavia during Operations JOINT ENDEAVOR and JOINT GUARD and later served as the **Deputy Chief of Police and SWAT Commander** for Fort Leavenworth, Kansas. He also previously worked as a lawyer at the law firm of **Williams & Connolly** and briefly served as an **Assistant United States Attorney** in the Eastern District of Virginia. He serves as a **Distinguished Visiting Lecturer** at the U.S. Military Academy in the Department of Law and is a **Fellow** with the **National Security Institute** at George Mason University.

France graduated in the academic top 1% of his **West Point** class, received a Masters in Criminal Justice from **Washburn University**, and graduated magna cum laude from **Georgetown University Law Center**. He also managed to pass both **Ranger School** and the **CPA Exam**.

France's commentary has been published by the Wall Street Journal; he has testified before Congress on the plight of Afghan Allies; and he speaks regularly on innovation, entrepreneurship, leadership, and service. Born in Saigon, Vietnam, France proudly grew up in Tumwater, Washington.

My family had a long journey to Tumwater. We traveled 8,993 miles from Saigon, Vietnam, escaping communism on an Air Force C-141 aircraft, living in a marine corps tent at Camp Pendleton, and eventually coming to Washington State where a sponsor family helped us get on our feet. My father, a former South Vietnamese Army Officer, found his first job at the Tyee Motor Inn while my Mom became a clerk at the Washington Department of Wildlife.

We settled in a home on Lark Street, then moved to 65th Way, a short walk from Tumwater High School, then later to Barnes Lake. I grew up a carefree child of the 80's, riding my bike around the neighborhood until the streetlights came on, and often enjoying Brewery City Pizza.

By the time I arrived at Tumwater High School, I had 8 years of Tumwater schooling, starting with Peter G. Schmidt then Tumwater Middle School. I cherish the fact that I graduated from THS in 1991 with classmates who I attended kindergarten with.

My Tumwater education simultaneously grounded me while opening up the world to me. My teachers believed in me but more importantly helped me believe in myself. My classmates and I struggled like all teenagers with the first steps of navigating our world and ourselves, but as often happens on hard journeys we became closer for it.

I look fondly back on my years at Tumwater High School. Even now I can close my eyes and hear the students cheering in the stadium at another T-Bird victory. I can feel the wooden bleachers beneath me and my classmates beside me during a school assembly. I can put myself back in the hallways of THS walking between classes and passing by the familiar faces of friends I had known for what seemed like forever. The years at THS both seem so long ago and yet seem like they were just yesterday. They were some of my best years, especially since they prepared me for the best that was yet to come.

I will forever be grateful to THS, my teachers, and my classmates for giving me the best thing a young man, especially one from a far off land, could ever hope for: a place to belong.
